

Early restoration of Statehood to J&K will empower elected Govt: CM Omar

Convenes meet to assess progress of works in Kulgam

SRINAGAR: Chief Minister Omar Abdullah on Friday hoped for an early restoration of Jammu and Kashmir's statehood, saying it would give more powers to the elected government and enable it to fulfil the promises made to the people during last year's assembly elections.

Talking to reporters in Kulgam district of south Kashmir, Abdullah said he had expected the Centre to fulfil the promise of statehood restoration made to the people of the Union territory from the floor of Parliament and the Supreme Court, but since that has not happened, he would continue pressing

"We are hoping for more powers and that is why we are stressing on the (restoration of) statehood, because that is a promise made to the people of Jammu and Kashmir, and that promise should be fulfilled," Abdullah told re-



porters in Kulgam district in south Kashmir.

"Only the Centre and the $\ensuremath{\mathsf{BJP}}$ can state the reasons for keeping Jammu and Kashmir without statehood. But, we will not stop trying (to make efforts)," he added.

Asked about PDP chief Mehbooba Mufti's reported conditions that the government support her party MLA's private member bills in exchange for backing the ruling party in the Rajya Sabha polls, Abdullah said it is the Speaker who decides which bill can be brought up in the assembly and which

"My government will not become a hurdle in the way of any such bill that benefits the people. But neither I nor any other member of the assembly can dictate to the Speaker

which bill to bring and which not. There is a procedure to bring a bill. Whichever bill is good, we will surely support those," he said.

Abdullah said one of his party colleagues has also come up with a bill on the issue of land grant, and he does not know whether that would also come up in the House or

MHA directs Judicial probe into Leh violence

LEH: In a major development aimed at addressing public concerns following the September 24 incident in Leh, which claimed four lives and left nearly 90 injured, the Government of India has ordered a judicial inquiry to be conducted by former Supreme Court Judge, Justice (Retd.) B.S. Chauhan. The announcement was

made by Dr Pawan Kotwal, Chief Secretary of UT Ladakh, during a press conference in Leh. He was flanked by Dr. S.D. Singh,

Dr Kotwal said the inquiry, one of the major demands of local community leaders and civil society groups, will thoroughly examine all aspects of the incident to ensure accountability and prevent recurrence. The Government of India has taken serious note of the demands.

The order for a judicial inquiry headed by a former Supreme Court Judge has been issued. Justice B.S. Chauhan will chair the commission, assisted by senior administrative and ▶ P11

India no longer remain silent after terror attacks, hits back: PM Modi

NEW DELHI: Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Friday asserted that India now does not remain silent after terror attacks but hits back using surgical and air strikes.

Addressing the NDTV World Summit here, he said there are several roadblocks and speed breakers but India remains "unstoppable". "India no more remains

silent after terror attacks but gives befitting reply through air strikes, surgical strikes and Operation Sindoor," he

Man chargesheeted for aiding LeT in terror plot across J&K

JAMMU: The National Investigation Agency (NIA) has filed a chargesheet against a migrant labourer from Bihar for allegedly aiding proscribed terrorist organisations, including Lashkar-e-Taiba (LeT), in planning terror activities in Jammu and Kashmir and Tamil Nadu. The move comes as part of the agency's ongoing efforts to dismantle terror networks operating through cyber channels across India.

The accused, identified as Akhalatur alias Mohammed Akhlaque Mujahid, a resident of Katihar district in Bihar, has been charged under Sections 196 and 197 of the Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita (BNS) and Sections

13(1)(b) and 39 of the Unlawful Activities (Prevention) Act, 1967. The chargesheet has been filed before the NIA Special Court in Poonamallee, Chennai. According to the NIA.

Akhalatur was working as a labourer at a private construction site in Chengalpattu, Tamil Nadu, when he was arrested by Kayar Police in April this year for alleged involvement in anti-national activities. Investigations revealed that he had established contact with Lashkare-Taiba handlers in Pakistan through cyberspace and had conspired with them to target "Kafirs" (non-believers) in Tamil Nadu.
