

DC Akshay chairs DRSC, DLMC Meeting to strengthen road safety framework

SRINAGAR: In order to prevent road accidents and take corrective measures, the Deputy Commissioner (DC) Srinagar, Akshay Labroo who is also Chairman of District Road Safety Committee and District Level Monitoring Committee (DRSC/DLMC) today chaired a meeting here at the Meeting Hall of the DC office Complex.

SSP Traffic Police, Ajaz Ahmad; RTO Kashmir, Qazi Irfan; Additional Deputy Commissioner, Mir Imtiaz Ul Aziz; Superintendent of Police, Umar Shah; Superintending Engineer R&B (North), Shabir Ahmad; Superintending Engineer of R&B (South), Tathir Manzoor; SDM West, Irfan Bahadur; SDM East, Zubair Ahmad, other senior Offi-

cers of School Education, Colleges, R&B and other concerned Departments attended the meeting.

At the outset, the meeting discussed in detail remedial measures to prevent road accidents and 'Hit and Run' cases in the district emphasizing implementation of road safety measures recommended by the Supreme Court.

On the occasion, the Deputy Commissioner emphasized the line departments to submit detailed GIS coordinates of accident-prone areas (black spots) along with transport data to identify vulnerable road stretches as per the Integrated Road Accident Database (IRAD) framework. The DC asked the R&B department to formulate a robust plan in accordance with the Supreme Court's directions for

the identification and management of black spots. He stressed that focused technological and enforcement interventions should be undertaken to significantly reduce road accidents particularly along highways.

Emphasizing data-driven planning, the DC highlighted the importance of using available traffic and transport data for safety interventions, strategic deployment of traffic personnel and implementation of corrective measures at accident-prone locations.

During the meeting, other issues included traffic decongestion, traffic regulation, particularly at black spots, proper illumination at cut points and removal of encroachments.

The meeting also reviewed the implementation of the Road Accident Victim



Fund. The DC stressed the need for swift disposal of related cases. Meanwhile, the DC also took appraisal of progress of ongoing traffic

decongestion measures in the City including at Natipora-Rambagh junction, Barzulla underpass and other areas.

It also said that zonal offices of the Soil and Water Conservation Department in Bandipora and

Gurez, though located in the district, fall under the administrative jurisdiction of the department's Baramulla office.

On steps taken to ensure smooth functioning, the government said that despite non-co-terminus jurisdictions, existing administrative arrangements are functioning smoothly and effective coordination mechanisms are in place among departments and district administrations to ensure seamless service delivery. It added that regular inter-departmental coordination and field-level supervision are carried out to address issues, if any.

Major relief for cancer patients as Budget cuts duty on 17 drugs

SRINAGAR: In a major relief to cancer patients and their families, the Union Budget has announced the removal of basic customs duty on 17 cancer drugs, a move expected to significantly reduce treatment costs and improve access to life-saving medicines.

Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman said that, to ease the financial burden on patients suffering from cancer, customs duty has been reduced not only for cancer medicines but also for drugs, medicines, and specialised medical food imported for the treatment of seven additional rare diseases.

Cancer treatments in Kashmir often run into lakhs, with imported medicines forming a major part of the expense. For many middle- and low-income families, the cost can be overwhelming.

Abdul Qayoom Dar, whose wife has been undergoing treatment for blood cancer for two years, said that the announcement brings hope, as every month they spend around 50,000 rupees just on medi-

cines. "We have sold our land and borrowed from relatives, and if the prices go down even by a little, it will help families like ours survive this fight," he told.

Fareeda Akhter, a 35-year-old cancer survivor from South Kashmir, said the decision could change lives. "I had to stop one course of treatment midway because we couldn't afford the imported drug. Cheaper medicines mean patients won't have to choose between health and financial ruin," she added. Dr Ashraf Dar, an oncologist, said that customs duty removal will directly impact drug pricing. While this is not a complete solution, it is a positive step toward making cancer care more accessible.

Families affected by cancer say the announcement has given them a sense of recognition and support from the government. "We feel seen," said Mohammad Irfan, whose 10-year-old daughter is undergoing chemotherapy. "Cancer doesn't just attack the body; it destroys savings and peace of mind. Any relief means hope." They, however, urged for a strong and effective cancer policy to help patients in every way.

Police Arrests Drug Peddler In Anantnag

SRINAGAR: Continuing its efforts to eradicate the menace of drugs from society, Police in Anantnag arrested a drug peddler and recovered contraband substance from his possession.

A police party of Police Station Pahalgam at checkpoint established at Kullar Hirpora, intercepted a suspicious individual. During search, 5.120 Kgs of Bung Boosa-like substance concealed in a bag was recovered from his possession. He has been identified as Basit Iqbal son of Mohammad Iqbal Shah, resident of Hirpora. He has been arrested and shifted to police station where he remains in custody.
