BJP MLAs ...

Rather continued with the Question Hour despite the uproar and dismissed the adjournment motion moved by PDP MLA Wahid Ur Rehman Para to discuss the incidents of "hate crime" against Kashmiris elsewhere in the country. As the assembly proceedings started, BJP MLA Surjit Singh Slatia raised the issue of Jammu University students who are on the roads in support of the demand for a law university.

"We are not against granting National Law University (NLU) for Kashmir but also want one such University for Jammu to fulfil the demand of the students of the region," he said.

While Slatia was speaking, other BJP MLAs also stood up and displayed placards in support of the demand and also raised slogans like "NLU for Jammu".

Congress legislator Nizam-ud-Din Bhat objected to the display of placards and said the recent meeting of the business advisory committee decided to maintain the decorum of the House while raising any issue.

"The action of displaying placards by BJP legislators is akin to encroachment and intrusion which is not acceptable. The government granted permission for NLU in Kashmir following due process," he said.

Amid the ruckus, National Conference legislator Mubarak Gul alleged that Kashmiri students and traders are facing harassment and assault in different parts of the country which is not acceptable.

Para informed the speaker that he had moved an adjournment motion to discuss growing incidents of "hate crime" against Kashmiri students and others.

National Conference MLA Saifullah Mir alleged that dozens of Kashmiris living outside the Union Territory are not allowed to move out of their accommodations and are facing assault of they come out which needs government intervention.

The speaker intervened time and again and requested the members to maintain decorum of the house.

"There is no question of adjournment motion because the issues raised can be taken up through other means in an appropriate manner without disrupting the Question Hour, which can be used to make the government accountable," he said.

He said the J-K government has already taken up the issue of harassment of Kashmiris with various state governments and is thankful to the Uttrakhand chief minister for taking immediate action recently in one such case.

Flood restoration ...

current financial year 2025-26.

"Further, an amount of Rs 289.39 crore was released during the current financial year 2025-26, under the State Disaster Response Fund (SDRF). Besides, an amount of Rs 100 crore (Rs 5.00 crore for each district) has been released under the UT Capex Budget (2025-26) of DMRRA under the activity 'Flood Relief Measures' to undertake urgent flood restoration works," the deputy chief minister said.

He said the Jal Shakti Department has received funds for ongoing flood management projects under Flood Management and Border Area Programme (FMBAP) during the current financial year.

"The released funds are mainly for Flood Management Work, amounting to Rs 164.35 lakhs and for Comprehensive Flood Management of River Jhelum, Phase-II amounting to Rs 6041.25 lakhs," he said.

Besides this, based on the report of inter-ministerial central team (IMCT), the GoI under SASCI (Scheme for Special Assistance to States for Capital Investment) has allocated Rs 1431 cr for J-K. This will be further released to implementing

departments once the detailed proposals for flood restoration works are received from the departments," Choudhary said.

Not satisfied with the response, Jasrotia and his party MLAs said the home ministry had already given Rs 212 crore to J-K as immediate relief and accused deputy chief minister of misleading the House.

Choudhary shot back at the BJP legislators and asked them to stop misleading people of Jammu on the pretext of discrimination with the region.

"We love central government as you do...But we say, whether the flood comes to Kashmir or Jammu, whether the damage is in Jammu or Kashmir, they are equally painful for us, but this is not the case with the BJP because their consciousness is not clear. We have pain for both regions which is evident when our government restored Darbar move to provide relief to the local traders. This shows we do not discriminate," he said. Continuing his tirade against the BJP, Choudhary said they are now demanding National Law University for Jammu after ensuring closure of Mata Vaishno Devi Medical college.

"They distributed sweets after putting the future of our children in danger. What answer do they have as to why the medical college was closed?" he said.

He said when the government receives the money from the Centre, it will be distributed equally.

Talking to the media, Jasrotia said he raised a question in the House but the government instead of giving a direct answer tried to "mislead" the House.

"I am asking one thing, the minister is replying to something entirely different. This has always been the technique of this government - to deviate and start an entirely different debate," the BJP leader said.

He said the floods and landslides in August-September last year caused major damage in Jammu, including loss of life, but the funds that came for flood relief were given only to Kashmir and not to Jammu.

"Funds should have been released to worst hit Jammu but instead, the government gave Rs 62 crore to Kashmir. This is clear discrimination," he said.

Gupta said he walked out in support of his party colleague as "we are not satisfied with the government response".

"He (Deputy CM) is clearly a person who discriminates against Jammu and has a consistent habit of ignoring the people of Jammu. My Udhampur constituency was the worst hit by floods but got nothing. The discrimination will not be tolerated," he added.

NC protests ..

Assembly proceedings resumed, the issue of alleged harassment was raised in the House by NC MLA Mubarak Gul and PDP MLA Wahid-ur-Rehman Para.

An 18-year-old Kashmiri youth suffered serious injuries after he was allegedly assaulted by a group of people while he was selling shawls in Uttarakhand's Dehradun district on January 28. There have been reports of Kashmiri shawl sellers being harassed and roughed up in some other states as well.

darkness and thick foliage.

This was the second encounter in Udhampur since December 15 when a policeman was killed at Soan village. However, the terrorists had managed to escape taking advantage of thick foliage and darkness.

A series of encounters – three in Kathua district and four in Chatroo forest belt in Kishtwar – also occurred in January, resulting in the killing of JeM terrorist Usman of Pakistan in Kathua and a paratrooper in Kishtwar amid intensified operations to hunt down terrorists hiding in the upper reaches of Jammu region.

Usman was part of the same group which is trapped in Udhampur district and was active in the area for the last several years.

time, I requested all the chief ministers and the Union home minister to ensure the ongoing harassment of Kashmiris – whether students or traders – stops. I am grateful to the chief minister of Uttarakhand for taking timely action, with cases registered and arrests made," Abdullah told reporters after the first sitting.

He expressed concern that harassment of Kashmiri-natives was being reported from neighbouring Himachal Pradesh despite the Congress being in power there.

"Himachal is our neighboring state, and despite the fact that the Congress is in power there, people (Kashmiris) are being stopped, harassed, and beaten. I request the Himachal Pradesh chief minister to take immediate action on this and put a stop to this victimisation and harassment of Kashmiris," Abdullah said.

Responding to a query on the row in the Lok Sabha on Monday over Leader of Opposition Rahul Gandhi's attempt to quote from what he claimed was the memoir of former Army chief M M Naravane, the Abdullah said "what happens in Parliament is Parliament's matter".

"It is the privilege of Parliament and the speaker to decide. Similarly, whatever we do in our assembly is our own matter. It would not be appropriate for our assembly to be discussed in Parliament, and likewise, I should not comment on what happened in Parliament," he said.

On Jammu and Kashmir Congress's suggestion to set up a coordination committee to strengthen the coalition, Abdullah said the question should be put to National Conference president Farooq Abdullah.

"I am the chief minister of Jammu and Kashmir; I am not the president of the National Conference. You can meet the National Conference president Farooq Abdullah and ask him what the party's stand is," he told reporters.

Meanwhile, CM Omar Abdullah today welcomed the US government's decision to bring down reciprocal tariffs on Indian goods, saying this would bring relief to many exporters in the country who were facing difficulties in view of the increased tariff.

US President Donald Trump on Monday announced that India and the US have agreed on a trade deal under which Washington will reduce the reciprocal tariff on Indian goods to 18 per cent from the current 25 per cent.

The announcement is crucial for India as the US imposed a steep 50 per cent tariff on Indian goods entering American markets from August 27, 2025.

"These tariffs were proving to be quite burdensome for us, and we also know very well why these tariffs were imposed. The United States was not happy with the fact that we buy oil from Russia. Trump announced that the Indian government has now stopped purchasing oil from Russia, and because of that, the tariffs will no longer be imposed on us," the chief

minister told reporters in the Assembly lawns here.

He said that if the Indian government had stopped buying oil from Russia, it might be a good development.

However, he wondered where the BJP-led government would obtain oil now that it is no longer sourcing from Russia, and whether purchasing from alternative sources would result in an increase in petrol and diesel prices in the country. "For that, we have to wait and see," Abdullah said.

Regarding the reduction of tariffs, the chief minister mentioned, "It will benefit our exports, which is a good step, as many of our exporters were facing significant challenges. Some even felt they might have to shut down their businesses. Now that tariffs have been reduced, we hope that their businesses will begin to thrive again."

Moving the resolution seeking their suspension, Rijiju said the members acted in utter disregard to the House and the authority of the Chair.

They also tore papers and them on the Chair and were named by the Chair for their behaviour, the minister added.

The suspended members had tried to climb on to the table of the Secretary General, tore papers and threw them at the Chair.

The House passed the resolution by a voice vote, following which the proceedings were adjourned for the day amid uproar.

Congress members, led by Rahul Gandhi, staged a protest outside Parliament building against the suspension of party members.

Later, Opposition MPs said the suspended members will continue to protest outside the House.

The suspended MPs also spoke with the media after coming out of the House.

Congress MP Tagore said, "This is an attack on the democracy of India, and we all know that the Prime Minister Modi does not want the Leader of the Opposition to speak."

"Yesterday, Opposition leader Rahul Gandhi ji was asked to submit authenticated documents on the book of General (Former Army Chief) MM Naravane ... Today, he did, and after that he was not allowed to speak. This has never happened... We protested that and then we were suspended," he said.

Congress MP Eden said Gandhi was not allowed to speak in the House and that is why "we raised slogans and got onto the dais, and that is when we got suspended".

"Eight of our members of the House were suspended, but we will continue our fight inside and outside Parliament. The members who are not suspended will fight inside," he said.

Another suspended Congress MP Warring said, "If I tore a paper, why did that situation arise? Why was it forced upon us? Because you suppressed our voice. You suppressed the voice of the Opposition and the Leader of the Opposition. For two consecutive days, you have not allowed the respected Leader of the Opposition, Rahul Gandhi, to speak. Why?"

Aujla, who was also suspended, slammed the BJP and said "they are disciples of Godse".

Krishna Prasad Tenneti, who was in the chair earlier during the day said one member addressed the Chair as "yaar" and at that moment he took a stand and questioned the MP.

"Another member standing next to him questioned what was objectionable about saying 'yaar', which itself was inappropriate and should not have happened. Subsequently, they came down to the Table of the House and threw papers. These actions are objectionable," he said.

Congress general secretary in-charge organisation K C Venugopal said the entire country is witnessing how the government is turning Parliament into a mockery.

"Yesterday, Rahul ji referred to an article from a magazine quoting the memoir of a former Army chief. At that time, the Speaker gave a ruling, on the government's instructions, that books or magazines cannot be quoted unless authenticated. Today, even before starting his speech, Rahul ji sought permission from the Chair to authenticate the magazine. The Chair permitted it, and he authenticated the magazine and laid it on the Table of the House."

"Even then, he clearly stated that he was not quoting the book or the magazine, but was speaking broadly on the country's internal security. Despite this, his microphone was switched off. If the Leader of the Opposition is not allowed to speak in Parliament, what will happen to parliamentary democracy," Venugopal asked.

Suspended MP Krishna Kumar Chamala said, "We were suspended from Parliament for one reason: questioning the BJP and its governance. Over the past two years, Leader of Opposition Rahul Gandhi ji has often been disturbed by BJP MPs while speaking the facts. Even today, as he spoke on the President's address, they tried to distract him to hide the truth from the people."

"This disruption is planned, with speakers sent specifically to distract him and prevent the failures of the BJP from being exposed," he said.

Since Monday afternoon, the House has been witnessing uproar after Gandhi was disallowed to cite the article based on excerpts from Naravane's unpublished book on India-China conflict of 2020.
