Markets Remain Closed on Sunday

Mcap of 6 of top-10 most valued firms climbs Rs 88,678 cr; ICICI Bank biggest winner

NEW DELHI: The combined market valuation of 6 of the top-10 most valued companies went up by Rs 88,678.1 crore in a holiday-shortened last week, with ICICI Bank emerging as the biggest winner. Last week, the BSE benchmark Sensex climbed 297.57 points, or 0.38 per cent, and the NSE Nifty went up by 42.9 points, or 0.17 per cent. "Markets ended the holiday-shortened week with modest gains, advancing in three of the four trading sessions. Sentiment remained constructive, supported by easing crude oil prices, improving geopolitical developments in West Asia, and selective buying by foreign institutional investors (FIIs)," Ajit Mishra, SVP, Research, Religare Broking Ltd, said. While Reliance Industries, HDFC Bank, ICICI Bank, State Bank of India, Bajaj Finance and Larsen



& Toubro were the gainers, Bharti Airtel, Tata Consultancy Services (TCS), Life Insurance Corporation of India (LIC) and Hindustan Unilever faced erosion from their valuation. The market valuation of ICICI Bank jumped Rs 29,588.75 crore to reach Rs 9,95,610.74 crore, the

most among the top-10 firms. HDFC Bank added Rs 24,718.3 crore, taking its valuation to Rs 12,25,981.44 crore. The valuation of Reliance Industries surged Rs 12,043.96 crore to Rs 17,83,926.92 crore and that of Bajaj Finance climbed Rs 11,580.28

crore to Rs 6,10,081.53 crore. The market capitalisation (mcap) of State Bank of India rallied Rs 9,322.93 crore to Rs 9,64,738 crore, and that of Larsen & Toubro edged higher by Rs 1,423.88 crore to Rs 5,80,550.83 crore. However, the mcap of Bharti Airtel tumbled Rs 35,615.21 crore to Rs 11,27,348.09 crore. The valuation of LIC eroded by Rs 21,188.74 crore to Rs 5,35,537.56 crore, and that of TCS declined by Rs 11,143.71 crore to Rs 7,58,206.42 crore. The mcap of Hindustan Unilever dipped by Rs 5,321.83 crore to Rs 5,10,624.92 crore. In the ranking of the top-10 most valued firms, Reliance Industries retained the number one rank, followed by HDFC Bank, Bharti Airtel, ICICI Bank, State Bank of India, TCS, Bajaj Finance, Larsen & Toubro, LIC and Hindustan Unilever.

'Made in India' label represents country's reputation, commitment to quality: Goyal

NEW DELHI: Union Commerce and Industry Minister Piyush Goyal said that the "Made in India" label represents the country's reputation and commitment to quality and stressed that quality is not just a corporate metric, but a national responsibility. He shared the story of Tamil Nadu-based Florence Shoe Company founder Aqeel Ahmed Panaruna and said an international customer spotted a luxury Hugo Boss shoe at Cairo Airport, checked its label and found it carried the words "Made in India". In a social media post, Goyal said, for entrepreneurs like Aqeel, quality is not just a corporate metric, it is a national responsibility. "The shoe had been manu-

factured by Panaruna's company in Ambur, Tamil Nadu. When you label a product 'Made in India', you are representing a country," he said. "His work has not only put Indian craftsmanship on global shelves for iconic brands but has also driven large-scale rural employment, championed women's empowerment in manufacturing, and pioneered sustainable zero liquid discharge technologies," the minister noted. "To Aqeel and countless Indian businesses setting global benchmarks, thank you for making the 'Made in India' label a symbol of trust, excellence, and pride." His remarks came during a business plenary session in London where the minister

was on an official visit from June 25-27 to discuss issues related to the implementation of the India-UK Comprehensive Economic and Trade Agreement (CETA). The pact will come into force on July 15. It provides duty-free access to Indian labour-intensive products, including leather and footwear. He also cautioned the Indian businesses against settling for modest growth in exports. Minister said if India were satisfied with such incremental gains, it would fall short of what the country is capable of delivering, especially as it expands participation in comprehensive free trade agreements and seeks a larger share in markets such as the United Kingdom, he added.

India's refining strength counters rising crude import dependence: EY Report



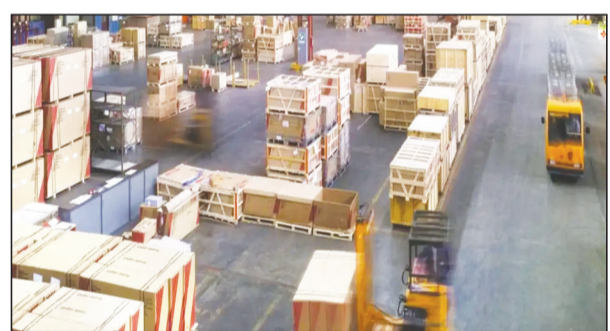
NEW DELHI: India has significantly strengthened its petroleum refining capabilities

even as its dependence on imported crude oil has continued to rise, according

to a report by EY. The study says that while crude oil import dependence has crossed 90% in FY26, the country's refining efficiency has improved by nearly 33% since FY98, reinforcing India's position as a major exporter of petroleum products. The report notes that crude oil import dependence has increased from around 55% in FY99 to over 90% in FY26, driven by rising domestic demand and declining crude oil production. Petroleum product consumption has grown from 90.6 million metric tonnes (MMT) in FY99 to 243.2 MMT in FY26, whereas domestic crude production has fallen to about 26 MMT. Despite this growing import reliance, India's refining sector has emerged as a major strength. Investments in modern technology and expanded refining capacity have enabled the country to efficiently process imported crude into value-added petroleum products for both domestic consumption and exports. Refining efficiency has improved from just above 0.95 in FY98 to 1.27 in FY26. The report also highlights a positive structural shift in the economy, with both energy intensity and petroleum consumption relative.

Comm Min convenes stakeholders' meet on June 30 on SEZ issues

NEW DELHI: The Commerce Ministry has called a meeting of stakeholders on June 30 to discuss issues related to special economic zones (SEZs), an official said. The meeting will focus on issues related to the harmonisation of export promotion schemes and SEZ reforms, the official said. The issues which are expected to figure in the deliberations include INR payment for SEZs to domestic tariff area (DTA) services; job work by units of these zones for DTA without linkage to exports, import substitution, reforms in the free trade warehousing zones,



and further promoting ease of doing business in these enclaves. The Government has set up a 17-member committee to suggest larger reforms in the policy for these zones. It is undertaking a background study focused on

the harmonisation of various prevalent export promotion schemes, including SEZs, export-oriented units (EoUs), MOOWR (Manufacturing and Other Operations in Warehouse), Advance Authorisation (AA), EPCG (export promotion

for capital goods), and Duty Free Import Authorisation (DFIA). The committee will submit a concept paper recommending a roadmap for broad-based and comprehensive reforms to formulate a SEZ 2.0 policy. The move is also important as when the SEZ law was formulated in 2005, Indian trade policy was different, and now the situation has changed due to global developments. These zones are treated as foreign territories for laws pertaining to customs (trade and import duties), with restrictions on duty-free domestic sales.

Bangladesh tribunal sentences three police officers to death over 2024 student protest

DHAKA: A special Bangladeshi tribunal on Sunday sentenced to death three police officers, including Dhaka's former police chief in absentia, on charges of attempts to tame the 2024 student-led violent street protest that toppled the then prime minister Sheikh Hasina's regime. The Bangladesh's International Crimes Tribunal (ICT-BD) sentenced former Dhaka Metropolitan Police (DMP) commissioner Habibur Rahman, addi-

tional deputy commissioner Rashedul Islam and former officer-in-charge of a Dhaka police station Mashur Rahman on charges of killing two people, including shooting a young man hanging from a building cornice during the violence. "They will be hanged by neck until their death," Chairman of Bangladesh's International Crimes Tribunal (ICT-BD) Mohammad Golam Mortuza Mozumder pronounced. The ICT-BD's three-judge

panel simultaneously handed down a life term to a police sub-inspector and a 20-year imprisonment to an assistant sub-inspector, the only accused to face the trial in person. The student-led violent street protests spread over July and August and dubbed as 'July Uprising' prompted Hasina to flee to India on August 5, 2024. Muhammad Yunus-led interim regime took charge three days later. A UN rights office report

in 2025 estimated that up to 1,400 people were killed between July 15 and August 15 during the July Uprising as Hasina's government ordered a sweeping security crackdown on the protesters. Three of the five convicts are presumed to be on the run at home or abroad and under the ICT-BD law, they might challenge the verdict in the apex Appellate Division of unitary Bangladesh's Supreme Court after their surrender or arrest. Earlier, on November 17,

2025, the ICT-BD sentenced to death Hasina and home minister of her cabinet Asaduzzaman Khan Kamal after trial in absentia conserving their superior responsibility in committing crimes by their attempt to tame the protesters. On the same day, the special court simultaneously handed down a five-year jail term to former inspector general of police Chowdhury Abdullah Al-Mamun, who had turned an "approver" or state-witness in the case.

11 killed as skydiving aircraft crashes in France

PARIS: At least 11 people, including the pilot, were killed when a light aircraft carrying skydivers crashed minutes after takeoff in the town of Tomblaine in north-eastern France on Sunday, local authorities said. The aircraft, operated by a parachuting school, went down around 11 a.m. local time near Nancy-Essey airfield in the Meurthe-et-Moselle department, CNN quot-

ed officials as saying. The victims included the pilot and 10 passengers, comprising five student skydivers and five instructors, according to local authorities. Yves Seguy, the regional prefect, told broadcaster BFM the aircraft appeared to suffer damage before plunging vertically to the ground. The crash occurred in a built-up area near a shopping centre, CNN reported.

Police have cordoned off the area and urged the public to avoid the vicinity of the airport as emergency and investigation teams responded to the scene. The French Interior Ministry said Interior Minister Bruno Retailleau is on its way to the crash site. The cause of the crash was not immediately known. Aviation authorities have launched an investigation into the incident.

US, Japan, South Korea step up efforts against North Korean cyber revenue networks

WASHINGTON: The United States, Japan and South Korea agreed to strengthen cooperation to counter North Korea's "cyber-enabled revenue generation activities, including cryptocurrency theft, money laundering and fraudulent information technology worker schemes," the U.S. State Department said on Friday. Officials from the three countries met in Washington under the Trilateral Diplomatic Working Group on DPRK Cyber Threats to coordinate responses to what they described as growing cyber threats posed by North Korea. The delegations reaffirmed their commitment to the com-

plete denuclearisation of North Korea and to cutting off sources of revenue that could support Pyongyang's prohibited weapons and ballistic missile programmes. Representatives from the United States, the ROK, and Japan expressed concern over cryptocurrency heists perpetrated by the DPRK, and noted reports of incidents including the theft of \$290 million from KelpDAO and \$285 million from Drift Protocol. The three countries agreed to "intensify efforts to expose North Korean cryptocurrency theft operations and raise awareness of cyber threats linked to Pyongyang in regions

including Europe, Southeast Asia and Africa." Officials also warned about the "increasing use of artificial intelligence by North Korean information technology workers engaged in schemes to obtain employment" with foreign companies and generate illicit income. They pledged support for industry initiatives aimed at improving the detection and prevention of such activities. The delegations stressed the importance of continued "law enforcement cooperation and stronger enforcement of international sanctions" to prevent North Korea from generating illicit revenue through cyber operations.

Terrorists attack paramilitary compound in Karachi, 6 killed

KARACHI: At least three terrorists and three paramilitary soldiers were killed after heavily armed militants of the banned Tehreek-e-Taliban Pakistan (TTP) attacked a compound belonging to the Sindh Rangers in Karachi, the army said on Sunday. The attack - the port city's first major terrorist strike since October 2024 - on the Pakistan Rangers (Sindh) camp was carried out by terrorists belonging to Jamaat-ul-Ahrar, a splinter group of the TTP, the Inter-Services Public Relations (ISPR), the military's media wing, said. The attack took



place around 8.30 pm Saturday when the terrorists rammed a vehicle into the gate of the Sindh Rangers Bhattai wing in the densely populated Gulistan-e-Jauhar area, and stormed in and lobbed hand grenades, which led to multiple explosions.

A local resident said authorities told people to stay inside their homes and some residential buildings and areas witnessed power cut. At least three terrorists were killed in the attack, and one, believed to be an Afghan national, was captured alive, the army

said without disclosing further details. "The assailants, after a blast at (the) main gate of the camp, attempted to breach the perimeter security," the ISPR said. However, their attempt was foiled by the Rangers troops, eliminating three terrorists and capturing one, who is an Afghan national in an injured condition, it added. During a visit to Karachi on Saturday, Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif accused India of using "proxies" in an attempt to undermine peace and stability in Pakistan. He, however, did not provide any evidence in support

of his allegations. The ISPR confirmed that three paramilitary soldiers were killed during the gun battle with the terrorists. Sanitisation operations were being conducted to eliminate any other terrorists in the area, ISPR said. A reliable security source said that Special Security Unit (SSU) commandos and the Anti-Terrorist Force (ATF) had helped the rangers kill the attackers and capture one injured. Immediately after the attack, the authorities cordoned off the compound and closed all nearby adjoining roads.
