Minor's rape, death in Kishtwar NCST issues notice to CS, DGP on Chatroo incident

JAMMU: Acting promptly upon the complaint submitted by the Tribal Gujjar Bakkarwal Welfare Foundation (TGBWF) through Member Trustee, Kabir Ahmed, the National Commission for Scheduled Tribes (NCST) has issued a notice dated 25 August 2026 under File No. NCST/ATY-4600/JK/3/2026-RU-IV. The notice has been addressed to the Chief Secretary, Union Territory of Jammu and Kashmir; the Director General of Police, Jammu and Kashmir; and the Senior Superin-

tendent of Police, Kishtwar. The Foundation has, at the outset, welcomed the Commission's prompt intervention in the case concerning the alleged sexual assault and death of a minor Gujjar Scheduled Tribe child in Chatroo, District Kishtwar, and the reported non-invocation of the Scheduled Castes and the Scheduled Tribes (Prevention of Atrocities) Act, 1989. The Commission also transmitted the notice by email to all three authorities. In the notice, it has expressly recorded that it has decided to investigate and inquire into the matter in exercise of the powers

conferred upon it under Article 338A of the Constitution of India. The Chief Secretary, DGP and SSP Kishtwar have been called upon to submit the relevant facts, information and details of the action taken on the allegations raised in the complaint within five days from receipt of the notice. The Commission has further cautioned that, if the required reply is not received within the stipulated period, it may exercise the powers of a civil court conferred upon it under Article 338A and issue summons seeking the appearance of the concerned authorities, either ►P11

Court: Handcuff Shabir Shah only when necessary

JAMMU: A special NIA court in Jammu has directed jail authorities to ensure that separatist leader Shabir Ahmad Shah is not unnecessarily handcuffed while being escorted from the Central Jail in Kot Bhalwal here to a hospital or court following his plea that handcuffing could cause him pain, and further endanger his health. Shah was arrested in April by the National Investigation Agency (NIA) in connection with a three-decade-old terror case related to mob violence and firing on policemen during a terrorist's last rites at Naaz crossing in Srinagar. His arrest comes shortly after he was released on bail after nearly seven years of imprisonment in other NIA cases, including one related to terror funding. Delhi Gurjars demand HC-supervised probe into death of minor Tribal girl

“Adv Sunil Kumar Bainsla seeks NCST intervention, ₹1 Cr compensation, protection for family & witnesses; demands time-bound investigation and fast-track trial in Delhi

NEW DELHI: The Gurjars of Delhi have expressed deep shock and anguish over the alleged sexual abuse and subsequent death of a minor tribal girl in Kishtwar and have demanded that the entire investigation be conducted under the close supervision of the High Court of Jammu & Kashmir to ensure a fair, impartial and time-bound investigation. Advocate Sunil Kumar Bainsla, representing the concerns of the Gurjar community in Delhi-NCR, strongly condemned what he described as a "barbaric and inhuman act" and said that the matter cannot be treated as an ordinary criminal case. He announced that he would approach the National Commission for Scheduled Tribes (NCST) seek-

ing immediate intervention, monitoring of the investigation and appropriate action under the law. According to the complaint proposed to be placed before the NCST, an FIR has already been registered against Khalid Hussain and his brother Tariq Hussain under relevant provisions of the Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita (BNS) and the Protection of Children from Sexual Offences (POCSO) Act. The complaint alleges that the minor girl was sexually abused on multiple occasions and that the accused included a person associated with her school. Advocate Bainsla said that, since the victim belonged to the Scheduled Tribe community, the applicability of the Scheduled Castes and Sched-

uled Tribes (Prevention of Atrocities) Act must also be examined strictly on the basis of the facts and evidence. He urged the authorities to explain why the relevant provisions of the Act were not invoked, wherever legally applicable. The Gurjar delegation has demanded that the NCST seek an Action Taken Report from the J&K Chief Secretary, Director General of Police and other concerned authorities regarding the investigation, invocation of the SC/ST Act, protection of the family and witnesses, compensation and rehabilitation. The complaint also seeks immediate preservation of all evidence, including viral videos, electronic communications, call records, financial transaction records, school records, medical and investigation reports, prescriptions, pharmacy records and medicines. An inquiry has also been demanded into whether any school official, doctor, panchayat member or other person ►P11

JMC seals 46 shops for rent default

JAMMU: The Jammu Municipal Corporation on Tuesday sealed 46 shops at the vegetable market in Indira Chowk for failing to pay rent for more than four years, officials said. A JMC team pasted notices and put locks and seals on the shops after they failed to clear their outstanding dues despite repeated notices, including a final notice, they said. The shopowners subsequently approached Deputy Commissioner (North), JMC, Sanjay Badyal, and assured the corporation that they would pay the rent regularly for the allotted shops, following which the sealing was lifted. Wandhama Massacre SIA reopens probe into 1998 killings of 23 Kashmiri Pandits

SRINAGAR: In a move to unmask the perpetrators of 1998 Wandhama massacre, the State Investigation Agency (SIA) of Jammu and Kashmir Police has reopened the investigation into the heart-wrenching killings, where 23 Kashmiri Pandits including toddlers were gunned down in Ganderbal district, officials said on Tuesday. The reopening of the case comes as part of an effort by the security agencies to re-launch probes into unresolved terror incidents involving the targeted killings of the minority Kashmiri Pandit community and to heal decades-old scars. The horrors of January 25, 1998 night, the eve of Republic Day, continue to haunt the collective memory of the region when a group of terrorists, disguised in Army uniforms, descended upon Wandhama village in central Kashmir and entered into four households belonging to Kashmiri Pandits for having a

cup of tea. The terrorists engaged with the unsuspecting residents in conversation, coaxing four Pandit families, who had courageously chosen not to migrate during the exodus of the early 1990s, to assemble together. Moments after a crackle on a walkie-talkie announced that the village was surrounded, the gunmen opened fire. Within minutes, 23 people from the community were mercilessly killed which included nine women and four children, two of them toddlers. Among the fallen was a one-year-old toddler whose body was riddled with 18 bullet wounds. In a desperate act of motherly love, a mother had tried to shield her infant in her lap, only for both to be fallen to terror bullets. The night's solitary survivor, young Vinod alias Ashoo, lived to tell the harrowing tale after sneaking to the upper storey of his house and hiding himself beneath a heap of dried cow-dung. He ►P11

8 OGWs held in 3 separate operations

SRINAGAR: Security forces have arrested eight overground workers of terrorists in three separate operations across Kashmir, officials said on Tuesday. On a tip off, police and army personnel launched a joint operation in an orchard at Imamsahib in Shopian district.
