All J&K Gujjar-Bakerwal Conference raises voice for tribal rights, welfare

Calls for constitution of Tribal Advisory Group

JAMMU: Significant Gujjar-Bakerwal Conference was held in Anantnag under the chairmanship of Choudhary Ajaz Ahmed Khan, former Minister in the Jammu and Kashmir Government.

The event witnessed participation from delegates representing Anantnag, Srinagar, Pulwama, and other adjoining areas. The gathering collectively raised several urgent and long-standing issues concerning the Gujjar and Bakerwal tribal communities and demanded action from the government on a priority basis.

One of the foremost demands put forth was the immediate constitution of a Tribal Advisory Group within the Tribal Affairs Department, to be headed by the Minister of Tribal Affairs. The speakers emphasized that tribal welfare and development cannot be left solely to the discretion of MLAs, many of whom are not adequately familiar with the problems faced by nomadic and forest-dwelling communities. They argued that the tribal population needs dedicated representation through an institutional body to ensure effective policy planning and execution.

Another major concern raised was the recent order by the Finance De-

partment placing tribal funds at the disposal of MLAs. Ch Ajaz Ahmed Khan strongly criticized this move, stating that such a mechanism sidelines the actual needs and priorities of the tribal population. He insisted that tribal-specific works must only be taken up after proper identification and recommendation by the concerned Tribal Advisory Group.

The conference also focused on compensation and disaster relief. Delegates demanded immediate financial assistance to those families whose cattle perished during recent unexpected snowfalls and hailstorms on high mountain peaks. They called upon the administration to release relief funds under the State Disaster Response Fund (SDRF) without delay. Special mention was made of families affected by a recent fire incident in Makbara Shangus, where homes belonging to Yasin Chouhan and Imtiaz Khan of Pahalgam were destroyed. The participants appealed to the Deputy Commissioner Anantnag to provide immediate relief through the Red Cross and other emergency measures.

The need for restoration of tribal grazing rights was another prominent issue discussed. The speakers noted that the Grazing Committee has not held a meeting in many years, which has adversely affected the seasonal migratory routes and access to traditional pastures. The conference demanded the urgent revival of these meetings to protect the livelihood of nomadic shep-

Furthermore, the participants emphasized the need for the development of six tribal routes which have already been identified by the Tribal Department. Implementation of this plan was urged without further delay.

A deep sense of frustration was expressed over the lack of recruitment since 2019, which has hit educated tribal youth the hardest. Ch. Rashid Azam Inqlabi, a senior community leader, highlighted the importance of technical and professional education for the younger generation. He demanded that the government provide unemployment allowance to the educated tribal youth — ₹10,000 per month for graduates, ₹7,000 for undergraduates, and ₹5,000 for matriculates and below - until regular employment avenues are created.

The issue of Forest Rights also found strong mention. The speakers criticized the government for failing to implement the Forest Rights Act (FRA) in letter and spirit. They urged

At the end of the session, an Adhoc District Committee for Anantnag was announced to coordinate local tribal affairs and mobilize further communi-

The conference concluded with a unanimous resolve to continue advocating for the socio-economic upliftment, rights, and dignity of the Gujjar-Bakerwal community across Jammu and Kashmir.

4 drug peddlers held with contraband worth Rs 7 lakh

JAMMU: Four alleged drug peddlers were arrested along with narcotic substances including heroin in Udhampur district of Jammu and Kashmir on Monday, police said.

Jeevan Kumar and Sunil Kumar, both residents of Jaganoo village, were arrested after 9.40 gm of heroin worth about Rs 6 lakh was recovered from their possession at Tikri on the Jammu-Srinagar national highway, a police spokesman said.

He said they were moving on a motorcycle when they were intercepted and subjected to checking by police.

Two more peddlers, driver Sanjay Kumar and Rohit Kumar of Kah-Phalata village, were arrested after 9.60 kg around Rs 1 lakh of poppy straw was recovered from their vehicle at Flata checkpoint in the Rehambal area, the spokesman said.

He said all four arrested peddlers were booked under the Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances (NDPS) Act.

The spokesman said police have so far registered 61 cases under NDPS since January this year in the district and arrested 87 accused, including seven under the stringent Prevention of Illicit Traffic in Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances (PIT-NDPS) Act.

The spokesman said 22 vehicles used for the transportation of narcotics were seized while six pharmacy shops were also attached for violating As part of financial disruption, he said 43 bank

accounts linked to drug peddlers were frozen, involving an amount of Rs 16,72,948. The seized contraband including heroin,

charas, poppy straw and ganja during this period was valued at Rs 2.42 crore in the black market, the spokesman said, adding police also attached properties worth Rs 4.69 crore, including multiple vehicles, residential houses and commercial assets related to both NDPS and bovine smuggling cases.
